











May 7th Meeting





Terry Golbek announced that Jimmy Clewes would be back at the Black Forest June 16,17 and 18 to present a 3-day hands-on workshop.

Greg Dahl told us that he has some wood to give away and we could help ourselves to it, and Bert also brought in wood to hand out to members.

Dwayne said that the items donated to the Alzheimer Society and



auctioned off raised \$330.

Don James announced that SAWS will hold their biennial exhibition August 30th to September 8th at the Southcenter Mall, and that entries must be made before June 14th/2013. Entries must be packaged and delivered to John Morel's shop. More details are available on the SAWS website.

Jim Jones announced that the Molly Winton demo will be held at the new Arts Center.



There will be a Sawdust Session May 25th at the Calgary Drop-In Center. See the map further on in this newsletter for the location.

Dwayne has been using the West System of epoxy, and asked if there was anything one can do if someone forgot the hardener portion of the mix.. Mike said that if you add some catalyst that it would eventually set up.

Duncan introduced Gord Langer who visited us from Edmonton today. Gord will demo his deep hollowing technique tonight, turning a vase similar to the one he is holding here from the Birch log pictured above on the lathe in front of Duncan.

Before starting the demo, Gord said that he has brought three DVD's as a donation to the club draw later in the evening. Thanks were offered to Gord for his generosity.

Gord announced that Carter Products in the USA has purchased rights to manufacture their deep hollowing hardware and that it will be available

soon directly from them. With the current system, it is possible to hollow to a depth of about 22 inches with the long bar of a diameter of 1-1/2 inches. Gord began the demo by marking the top and bottom center of the log, trying as much as possible to stay as close as possible to the pith of the log. He uses the Elio center in

the headstock to hold the log securely and brings up the tailstock and tightens it. With a sharp knife he cuts the bark off first to prevent it from flapping around when roughing the log to round. This step makes the roughing process somewhat easier, and the bark comes off easily.

He starts by making a cylinder first and forms a flat surface at the tailstock end for securing a faceplate. After this step, the Oneway 6" faceplate is fixed to this flat surface with 2" wood screws – lots of screws!

After remounting it with the faceplate, Gord re-tunes the log to a cylinder and marks where the tip of the screws are in the log to avoid hitting them later. He then adds $\frac{1}{2}$ " for the chuck, $\frac{1}{2}$ " for the bottom thickness and $\frac{1}{2}$ " for contingency.

He trues up the end of the log, and then using a 3" Forstener bit he drills a hole to the above marked location. Gord noted that even new Forstner bits should be sharpened before use as they can drift in a hole of this depth if they are not sharp. He removes the tailstock and wraps the log in plastic for the meeting break.

After the break, Gord rubbed some paraffin wax on each toolrest. He finds it much more convenient to use two toolrests to turn down the exterior as he works his way down the vase from top to bottom. He presets the cutter so that it is about 1 mm below the center of the headstock, and leaves the top of the vase a bit thicker as he works his way hollowing from top to bottom. It is not possible to return to make adjustments

to the thickness since the work could shatter, so he ensures the vase wall is the desired thickness before proceeding further towards the bottom. Gord has a laser pen shown in this photo on the deep hollowing hardware to measure thickness as he goes. Alternately, he uses a light on the cutter end and can gauge the

thickness by watching the translucently of the vase sidewalls.



Before going too far towards the tailstock, he turns a shape on the vase bottom.

After cleaning up the bottom, he sands the outside with Siasoft sandpaper with grits from 80-500. After parting it off, he uses a mandrel to reverse chuck it as shown here. Gord does not use a live center for this step as if it is not dead on the first time, it is impossible to re-center it. He then uses a small gouge to clean up the bottom and a dovetail scraper to add a groove.

Following these steps, and using a power, carver Gord removes the small nib left at the bottom. With a finished wall thickness of about ½" inch, he will put the vase in a paper bag to finish drying for about 10 days before remounting it for completion.




The meeting was completed at 9:35PM.
