The Making Of An Expressive Piece by Terry Golbeck

Terry Golbeck gave a presentation on the making of an expressive piece. The highlights of the presentation were:

EXPRESSIVE PIECE

- Conveys an idea that you want to reveal
- Others can reflect on what your piece means to them
- Others may or may not "get" your idea
- It may or may not matter to you that others understand your idea
- Examples of
 - The "Long Stem Cherry Holder"
 - The Gilded Walnut









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Fresh Eyes


- I am very new at making expressive pieces
- Possibly through my beginners eyes I can observe what it has taken to start making this type of piece
- Sometimes with lots of experience, one tends to forget what it took to get started

Blocks

- We can think that we are not very creative
- Concern of what others may think of our new expressive attempts at making
- Often what is missing is a process
 - Knowing where to start and the steps
- Creative expression comes through making
 - More a process of play than work
- Learned a process from Stephen Hogbin

Desire to Make an Expressive Piece

- The satisfaction that already comes from fine craftsmanship is further deepened and enhanced
- Can provide a sense of meaningfulness
- Frank Sudol taught the value of self expression through making
 - Story of Frank Symbothy

Harvesting and Idea

- Live in an "open question"
- Practice being visually appreciative
- Frank kept pictures in an "inspiration box"
- Idea maturation time may be in the moment or a life time
- Clay Foster says the Mayan structures that he visited 30 years ago are in the background of his making

Terry then went through an example of the process he went through in the making of the wall plaque pictured to the right.

The idea came from a visit to a temple in Shanghai, seeing the original symbol, learning it was the traditional Chinese symbol for dust, learning that dust is a metaphor and refers to the many and various interferences in business and personal life. For example; it could be uncontrollable change, unexpected event, human folly, uncertainties or instabilities.





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We live in a dusty imperfect world. Because of the interference of dust things always move toward the unsatisfactory or less than ideal. Some people feel they can't change the situation and they seek peace by withdrawing from the world. Despite the pervasive interference of dust some people develop a strong mind set to eliminate the negative impact of dust. It implies that people should emphasize self-cultivation rather than complaining, drifting with the tide or running away. "Dust" is an important part of Zen Philosophy and has been pursued by Chinese intellectuals since ancient times.

Idea to Object

- Douglas Fisher's approach to making wall plaques provides a canvas and a frame
- The multi axis border treatment creates a sense of multiple perspectives which is fitting for a piece on philosophy
- Gold gilding "pops" the symbol off the surface and make it look rich and important

Influence of Graeme Priddle

- Make a background pattern that means something to you and adds to the story of the piece
- Built a "hot poker" from a battery charger
- Used a rotary tool to care a five petal design on a copper road to make a branching iron
- The number "5" is very important in Chinese Culture
- Colours used are prevalent in Chinese Culture

Appreciation

- The Plaque portrays Chinese Culture
- It is a delightful reminder of my trip
- The "Dust" metaphor is thought provoking
- I like the contrast between the look of solid Gold and the humble idea of dust
- Reflected on what I had learned from others
- Leads me to experiment with other symbols, laser carving and background patterns.
